


Arizona EMS and Trauma System as a Component of Post-Crash Care

MVT Total 16,079 25%

- **Motor Vehicle Trauma (MVT) Occupant** was the second highest mechanism of injury for adults, with 12,247 injuries reported, 18.72% of all incidents reported to the Trauma Registry in 2021.
- **MVT Occupant** was also the second most reported mechanism of injury for pediatric patients (0-17), with 1,558 injuries reported (22.04% of all pediatric incidents reported).
- MVT Occupant accounted for over 1/4 of the 78 pediatric deaths reported.
- 29.67% of motor vehicle occupants were NOT using a passenger restraint
- Passengers were 4 times more likely to die in a car accident if not wearing a seatbelt
- Motorcyclists without helmets were 2 times more likely to die and 2 times more likely to suffer a Traumatic Brain Injury

Evidence-Based Interventions that Save Lives

Participating EMS Agencies Receive:

- **Training and Technical Assistance** ADHS and the University of Arizona have developed an online interactive Naloxone Leave Behind training.
- Free Naloxone Leave Behind Kits Each Naloxone Leave Behind kit includes a custom pouch with two doses of intranasal naloxone, instructions for use, and a list of resources specific to each EMS agency's jurisdiction
