

Special Ignition Interlock Restricted Driver License (SIIRDL)

What is a SIIRDL?

In some cases involving driver license suspension/revocation resulting from a DUI-related violation a SIIRDL is issued to people who have an ignition interlock device installed and agree to drive under specific restrictions during the remainder of their suspension/revocation time period. The SIIRDL is strictly voluntary for those who are eligible and may be cancelled if the recipient chooses not to continue the option of restricted driving or has additional suspensions.

Please Note: A SIIRDL is voluntary and is not a requirement. If the SIIRDL is a result of a violation on or after 01/01/2023 it may be credited toward an Ignition Interlock Order on the driver record.

Who is Eligible for a SIIRDL?

In cases involving driver license suspension/revocation resulting from a DUI-related violation date on or after Feb. 1, 2006, you **may** be eligible to apply for a special restricted driver license if you have:

- Contacted [MVD or Authorized Third Party office](#) to verify eligibility (or received a notice of eligibility from MVD).
- No other outstanding withdrawal actions pending on your driving record.
- Installed an ignition interlock on your vehicle, install must be received electronically by the department and must be within 30 days of SIIRDL issuance.
- Complied with mandatory alcohol treatment programs (if required) and submitted proof of completion to MVD.
- Submitted proof of future financial responsibility to MVD (e.g., certificate of automobile liability insurance known as an SR22). An SR22 is not required for a SIIRDL when it is related to an Admin Per Se Suspension.
- Paid all applicable fees.

Note: violations during SIIRDL time may result in cancelation of your SIIRDL driving privileges.

How do I get the Ignition Interlock installed?

A list of ignition interlock service providers authorized for use in the State of Arizona is available at azdot.gov/mvd/services/driver-services/ignition-interlock/interlock-installation-and-monitoring.

What do I do after my SIIRDL time is over?

Your SIIRDL will expire the same date as the suspension/revocation that the SIIRDL is attached to. When your SIIRDL expires, it is against the law for you to continue to drive until you have complied with all state requirements. In order to comply, you must:

- Return to an [MVD or Authorized Third Party office](#) and apply to reinstate your driving privileges.
- Pay all applicable fees.

You may also be required to:

- Complete a revocation application
 - complete and submit no more than 30 days prior to your eligibility date, (revocation end date).
- Continue your SR22.
- Continue to maintain a Certified Ignition Interlock Device.
